

# Ordinance worries Hispanic residents

FARMERS BRANCH, Texas — This Dallas suburb could become the first city in Texas to adopt a sweeping ordinance intended to keep out illegal immigrants, a cause for concern among its large minority population.

More than 50 municipalities nationwide have considered, passed or rejected laws banning landlords from leasing to illegal immigrants, penalizing businesses that employ undocumented workers and making English the local official language.

But until now, that trend hasn't been matched in the Lone Star State.

"This is not just a Farmers Branch problem," Elizabeth Villafranca said of the proposal.

Villafranca, whose family owns a Mexican restaurant in Farmers Branch, said she worries that such laws will spread to other cities if the City Council approves the proposal. The measure is expected to be submitted to the council today, but there

was no indication when it might be put to a vote.

Since 1970, Farmers Branch has changed from a small, predominantly white bedroom community with a declining population to a city of almost 28,000 people, about 37 percent of them Hispanic, according to the census.

It also is home to more than 80 corporate headquarters and more than 2,600 small and mid-size firms, many of them minority-owned.

The local debate over illegal immigration began in August and spawned demonstrations by both sides of the issue. Council members adopted a resolution criticizing the federal government for not aggressively addressing the issue.

A councilman has given city attorneys drafts of an ordinance that would make English the city's official language and proposals to fine companies and landlords who do business with illegal immigrants.

### Gallaudet seeks input on new president

WASHINGTON — Gallaudet University is inviting students, faculty and staff members, and alumni to voice their opinions on the qualities they want in a new leader, following protests that led to the ouster of incoming president Jane K. Fernandes.

"The board was very attentive," Alexander Zernovoj, president of the Gallaudet Graduate Students Association, told The Washington Post.

Fernandes' appointment was revoked last month after weeks of protests.

### Ford becomes longest-living

LOS ANGELES — Gerald R. Ford has surpassed the late Ronald Reagan to become the longest-living U.S. president.

Ford, who turned 93 on July 14, 2006, became the oldest president Sunday by living to 93 years and 121 days. The milestone is based on full days.

"The length of one's days matters less than the love of one's family and friends," Ford said this week from the Rancho Mirage compound he shares with former first lady Betty Ford.

The nation's 38th chief executive was president from Aug. 9, 1974, when Richard Nixon resigned, until January 1977.

Reagan, born Feb. 6, 1911, was 93 years, 120 days when he died June 5, 2004. He had surpassed the longevity milestone of John Adams, the nation's second president, in 2001.

# Bishops focus on strengthening church

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BALTIMORE — At a national meeting starting Monday in Baltimore, the bishops are expected to channel resources away from broad social pronouncements and focus more on defining Catholicism for an often uninvolved flock.

"It's not that the bishops as a national organization will no longer be interested in sociopolitical issues," said Russell Shaw, a writer on Roman Catholic issues who spent more than 15 years as a spokesman for the

conference. "But the emphasis is shifting to the life of the church itself and its own internal problems."

The bishops will vote on documents explaining the church's ban on artificial contraception and worthiness for receiving Holy Communion. The prelates will also consider new guidelines on ministry to gay Catholics, which explain the theological underpinnings of church teaching that marriage should be limited to one man and one woman.

# New trend in study abroad

American college students are becoming more adventuresome as they study abroad, showing less interest in English-speaking destinations such as Great Britain and more in such alternatives as China, India, Argentina and Brazil.

"I'm sure my friends and family would say 'Why did you pick Africa, a poor coun-

try, why don't you go to Europe or somewhere more glamorous?'" said Xinh Pham, a Michigan State student who took part in a university-sponsored program to study nutrition in Tanzania last summer.

But the trip "totally changed my views of the world," she said.

Allan Goodman, president of the Institute of International Education, said a range of

factors contributed to the trend, from growing awareness of globalization after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks to programs such as President Bush's National Security Language Initiative.

Other figures to be released later today tracked the flow of students from foreign countries into U.S. universities and found that, after two years of declines, enrollment was up about 8 percent.

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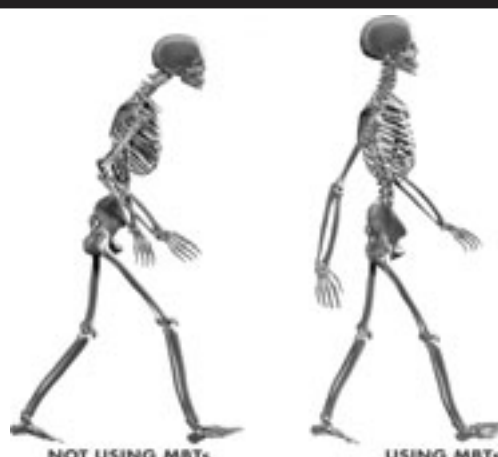
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
